Fairness

Matthew 25:14-30 English Standard Version (ESV)

The Parable of the Talents

¹⁴ "For it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants^[a] and entrusted to them his property. ¹⁵ To one he gave five talents, ^[b] to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. ¹⁶ He who had received the five talents went at once and traded with them, and he made five talents more. ¹⁷ So also he who had the two talents made two talents more. ¹⁸ But he who had received the one talent went and dug in the ground and hid his master's money. ¹⁹ Now after a long time the master of those servants came and settled accounts with them. ²⁰ And he who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five talents more, saying, 'Master, you delivered to me five talents; here, I have made five talents more.²¹ His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant.^[C] You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master.' ²² And he also who had the two talents came forward, saying, 'Master, you delivered to me two talents; here, I have made two talents more.' ²³ His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master.' ²⁴ He also who had received the one talent came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew you to be a hard man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you scattered no seed, ²⁵ so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here, you have what is yours.' ²⁶ But his master answered him. 'You wicked and slothful servant! You knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I scattered no seed? 27 Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and at my coming I should have received what was my own with interest.

²⁸ So take the talent from him and give it to him who has the ten talents. ²⁹ For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance. But from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. ³⁰ And cast the worthless servant into the outer darkness. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

The "Parable of the Talents" challenges us in many ways. One particular challenge invoked by Jesus concerns the concept of fairness. As Americans we love to discuss fairness. Most individuals want fairness imparted to their person and seek to return the same toward others. Politicians speak often of fairness and how they will bring fairness to their constituents. We teach our children to be fair with others and seek to make this part of their mindset in all endeavors.

Just for the record, the concept of fairness is a very honorable thing to seek and hope for. However, in all the discussion and seeking for fairness there is just one problem, the concept is not attainable for us mortals. In other words, in this world there is no such thing. Wait a minute preacher; I've been told to be fair and sought to put it into practice all my life. You have finally gone off the deep end! I went off the deep end many moons ago but when it comes to my statement that fairness does not exist in this world; I stand by my comment. It just can't be everyone knows what fairness is. I would say everyone thinks they know what fairness is, however, have you ever seen it truly in all honesty implemented. I can say with veritable confidence you have never seen fairness implemented in purity.

The answer is so simple it evades our grasp. Several issues make fairness unattainable to mortal man. First, who decides what is fair? Fairness in most instances is a matter of perspective, our personal perspective. Second, what is fair for you may not be fair for me and vise-versa, again a matter of perspective. Fairness has become not a reality but a circumstance. Finally, Miroslav Volf in his work, *Exclusion & Embrace: A Theological Exploration of Identity, Otherness, and Reconciliation* brings forth a reality most of humanity fails to comprehend. His premise is that try as we may we can never fully exit our own person to fully see the other persons point of view with the same fullness that we perceive our own and vise-versa. Thus, fairness, reconciliation, forgiveness, compromise and healing can never be fully found within human relations. The only one who can fully see all perspectives and do so indiscriminately is God. Therefore, try as we may we can never truly have fairness in its truest and purist sense.

This all sounds fine but what does it have to do with the "Parable of the Talents." In the parable God takes the unfaithful servants talent that he hid and gives it to the servant that started with five talents and doubled them to ten. We would think that in order to be fair God would give it to the faithful servant who doubled his two talents He was faithful was he not? He doubled his talents just like the other faithful servant did. Yes, Yes, and Yes, however, God reveals a great truth to us by doing this. We must remember that the talents were distributed according to ability. The man who ended up with ten talents has more ability than the man who doubled his and ends up with four. For the master, the bottom line is, who will do more with their ability? In other words, who can produce the most with what is given? The answer is the man with the most ability and the best track record.

In this parable God says, "For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance. But from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away." God is not looking for fairness but for faithfulness. If we as the church are not faithful in our mission then God will take what we have and give it to others who will be faithful and fulfill his mission. It is time for us to stop looking at what we think we can't do and quit letting obstacles hinder our way and squash our talents. Instead, we must look at all events as opportunities that God has given us the ability to overcome through his presence, help and power.

The concept is simply opportunity opens up opportunity. With each opportunity more things become available for us to do. Doors that once seemed closed suddenly open. This is God's way of moving his Kingdom forward. A way to look at this phenomenon is through schooling. One must finish grammar school before going to middle school. Once you complete middle school the door for high school is opened. This in turn opens the opportunity for one to attended undergraduate classes that can lead to graduate school and this to a doctorate. Opportunity bringing about opportunity.

We may start small and with little expectation, however, with God's involvement great and mighty things can come from humble beginnings.

First Lutheran Foundation Committee accepting applications for grants



Shawls: Shawls should be at least 60" long and about 24" wide. They need to be long enough to easily wrap around shoulders or be long enough to cover a person taking a nap. Triangle shaped shawls are pretty, but haven't been as useful to our recipients.

Baby blankets: should be at least 40" x 40"

Hats, mittens, & scarves: There is a bag in the knitwits cabinet labeled for the mitten tree. When the tree goes up in December, we will place those items on it.

Yarn has been donated to us and is available for anyone wishing to make items for our ministry.
